Per alcuni la vita è sogno. Lotto e Mathilde, il ragazzo d'oro e la principessa di ghiaccio, si conoscono alla fine dell'università e si sposano subito: giovani, bellissimi e innamorati, si avviano verso un destino di felicità. Lotto depone senza troppo dolore le ambizioni da attore per diventare celebre come autore teatrale, e Mathilde si rivela la moglie ideale, la musa silenziosa: lui ama le luci della ribalta e lei sceglie il riparo delle quinte, lui è fiducioso e aperto verso le persone e il futuro, lei è più oscura e sfuggente. Ventiquattro anni di matrimonio per una coppia perfetta, quella che vedono - o credono di vedere - tutti da fuori: ma basta cambiare punto di vista e la maschera cade. Il fato cala senza pietà; e Mathilde è la furia che libera un carico di rivelazioni. Con la sua scrittura intensa e luminosa Lauren Groff è riuscita a dare grande respiro narrativo a quella che si può leggere come una pièce teatrale, una tragedia animata da due personaggi folgoranti: perché ogni storia ha due facce, e la chiave di un matrimonio non è la verità, ma il segreto.

Onniscienza, narratori-personaggio che esorbitano dai loro confini, autori che si mettono in scena apertamente e finzionalizzano la propria vita, che posano da saggisti o si dislocano in Rete. Sono tutti fenomeni che caratterizzano la narrativa italiana più recente e che ruotano intorno allo stesso presupposto, vale a dire all'esibizione di chi racconta, al protagonismo delle voci narranti e agli eccessi degli autori alle loro spalle. A partire dallo studio di alcuni fra i romanzi più importanti pubblicati in Italia negli ultimi dieci anni, questo libro passa in rassegna le principali strategie narrative attraverso cui tale tendenza prende corpo e le retoriche della voce che ne sono alla base. Nel farlo, prova a riflettere sul perché della loro diffusione, collocando i romanzi presi in esame sullo sfondo di una serie di mutamenti relativi non soltanto alla contemporaneità letteraria più stretta, ma anche allo spazio transmediale in cui i testi si muovono oggi e all'idea di racconto che sempre più si sta imponendo.

"The day I returned to Templeton steeped in disgrace, the fifty-foot corpse of a monster surfaced in Lake Glimmerglass." So begins *The Monsters of Templeton*, a novel spanning two centuries: part a contemporary story of a girl's search for her father, part historical novel, and part ghost story. In the wake of a disastrous love affair with her older, married archaeology professor at Stanford, brilliant Wilhelmina Cooper arrives back at the doorstep of her hippie mother-turned-born-again-Christian's house in Templeton, NY, a storybook town her ancestors founded that sits on the shores of Lake Glimmerglass. Upon her arrival, a prehistoric monster surfaces in the lake bringing a feeding frenzy to the quiet town, and Willie learns she has a mystery father her mother kept secret Willie's entire life. The beautiful, broody Willie is told that the key to her biological father's identity lies somewhere in her family's history, so she buries herself in the research of her twisted family tree and finds more than she bargained for as a chorus of voices from the town's past -- some sinister, all fascinating -- rise up around her to tell their side of the story. In the end, dark secrets come to light, past and present day are blurred, and old mysteries are finally put to rest. *The Monsters of Templeton* is a fresh, virtuoso performance that has placed Lauren Groff among the best writers of today.

Ma soprattutto è la bravura letteraria della Bertino, la sua scrittura unica, a farne un libro magico, originalissimo, pieno di humour e perspicacia, capace di condurci all'interno di un viaggio dentro noi stessi impossibile da dimenticare.

In "Lucky Chow Fun," Groff returns us to Templeton, the setting of her first book, for revelations about the darkness within even that idyllic small town. In some of these stories, enormous changes happen in an instant. In others, transformations occur across a lifetime--or several lifetimes. Throughout the collection, Groff displays particular and vivid preoccupations. Crime is a motif--sex crimes, a possible murder, crimes of the heart. Love troubles recur; they're in every story--love in alcoholism, in adultery, in a flood, even in the great flu epidemic of 1918. Some of the love has depths, which are understood too late; some of the love is shallow, and also understood too late. And mastery is a theme--Groff's women swim and baton twirl, become poets, or try and try again to achieve the inner strength to exercise personal freedom. Overall, these stories announce a notable new literary master. Dazzlingly original and confident, *Delicate Edible Birds* further solidifies Groff's reputation as one of the foremost talents of her generation.

The impassioned love of two teenagers leaves a path of destruction in its perilous wake Seventeen-year-old David Axelrod is consumed with his love for Jade Butterfield. So when Jade's father exiles him from their home, David does the only thing he thinks is rational: He burns down their house. Sentenced to a psychiatric institution, David's obsession metastasizes, and upon his release, he sets out to win the Butterfields back by any means necessary. Brilliantly written and intensely sexual, *Endless Love* is the deeply moving story of a first love so powerful that it becomes dangerous--not only for the young lovers, but for their families as well. In these vigorous stories, Lauren Groff brings her electric storytelling to a world in which storms, snakes and sinkholes lurk at the edge of everyday life, but the greater threats are of a human, emotional and psychological nature. Among those navigating it all are a resourceful pair of abandoned sisters; a lonely boy, grown up; a restless, childless couple; a searching, homeless woman; and an unforgettable conflicted wife and mother. The stories in these collection span characters, towns, even centuries but Florida - its landscape, climate, history and state of mind - becomes the gravitational centre. With

shocking accuracy, Groff pinpoints the connections behind human pleasure and pain, hope and despair, love and fury - the moments that make us alive.

A wryly humorous, impeccably observed novel about the capriciousness of love Omar Razaghi posts a letter on September 13, 1995 that will change the course of his life forever. A doctoral student at the University of Kansas, he writes to the estate of the Latin American author Jules Gund, requesting permission to write Gund's authorized biography. His request is refused, but Omar has already accepted a fellowship from the university, and with his girlfriend's vehement encouragement, he goes in person to Uruguay to petition to Gund's three executors. Although Caroline Gund, Jules' wife, and Arden Langdon, Jules' mistress and mother of his child, are initially opposed to the idea of a biography, Omar has the support of Adam, Jules' older brother, and hopes to be able to persuade the two women. Omar's unexpected arrival in Uruguay reverberates through this odd and isolated little family group, and his stay in the languid, dreamy Ochos Rios makes him question his former life in Kansas, and his ability-even his desire-to write an "authorized" life. A novel about the random nature of love, and the ways in which we confront or avoid life's choices, *The City of Your Final Destination* is a touching, clever and wonderfully comic fourth novel from Peter Cameron. *The City of Your Final Destination* was made into a film, starring Anthony Hopkins, Laura Linney and Charlotte Gainsbourg.
