New Kalabsha is a small island functioning as an open-air museum for temples that had to be relocated because of the Aswan High Dam. And while most visitors would never suspect it, Philae Temple too was entirely dismantled and moved to a new island called Agilkia.

Originally located around 30 miles south of modern Aswan, the Temple of Kalabsha resided on the western bank of the Nile in Nubia and sat atop the ruins of a sanctuary built during the rule of Amenhotep II.

When the High Dam was built at Aswan, a number of ancient temples were moved to the island near Aswan, now known as New Kalabsha. The most significant monument reconstructed here is the Kalabsha Temple, dedicated to the Nubian god Mandaulis. This measures 74 meters from the pylon to the rear wall and is 33 meters wide, making it the largest freestanding temple in Egyptian Nubia.

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Kalabsha temple is located on an island in the middle of the Lake Nasser, next to the Aswan High Dam, and around 16 kilometers from Aswan. Nevertheless, it turns out that this temple is not situated where it stood originally. Due to the construction of the Aswan High Dam, the temple was relocated to protect it from the rising waters.

New Kalabsha is a promontory located near Aswan in Egypt. It houses several important temples, structures, and other remains that have been relocated here from the site of Old Kalabsha and other sites in Lower Nubia, to avoid the rising waters of Lake Nasser caused by the construction of the Aswan High Dam. 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Temple of Kalabsha This was one of the largest free-standing temples of Nubia, over 76 metres long and 22 metres wide. It has been saved by the Federal Republic of Germany from the flooding. Twenty thousand tons of stone were transported and the temple was re-erected fifteen kilometres south of Aswan, close beside the High Dam.

The imposing temple of Kalabsha was built under Emperor Augustus in the 1st century AD on the site of earlier buildings by Amenhotep II and Ptolemy IX. Dedicated to the fertility god Marul (known as Mandulis by the Greeks), it was moved 50 km (31 miles) north of its original location in 1970 in a German-funded rescue operation following the flooding of Nubia.
